

Saints Thaddeus and Bartholomew Apostles. First Enlighteners of Armenia

Saint Thaddeus - St. Jude, known as Thaddaeus, was a brother of St. James the Less, and a relative of Our Saviour. Ancient writers tell us that he preached the Gospel in Judea, Samaria, Idumaea, Syria, Mesapotamia, and Lybia. According to Eusebius, he returned to Jerusalem in the year 62, and assisted at the election of his brother. St. Simeon. Bishop of Jerusalem. He is author of an epistle (letter) to the Churches of the East, particularly the Jewish converts, directed against the heresies of the Simonians, Nicolaites, and Gnostics. This Apostle suffered martyrdom in Arme-





nia. The final conversation of the Armenian nation to Christianity did not take place until the third century of our era.



St. Bartholomew – His name is patronymic, meaning "son of Tolmai". Sometimes he is identified with Nathaneal whom Philip led to Christ. According to the historian Eusebius, when Pantainus of Alexandria visited India between 150 and 200 A.D., he found there the Gospel according to Matthew left behind by Bartholomew one of the Apostles. According to tradition was flayed and crucified upside down at Albanapolis in Armenia.

Mission of the Armenian Orthodox Apostolic Church

The Mission of the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church is to preach the Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ and to proclaim its message of salvation. This mission is realized through worship, education, witness, service, and a common life in Jesus Christ as expressed in the distinctive faith - experience of the Armenian people. All members of the Armenian Church - both clergy and lay - are called to participate fully in its mission.

Commemoration of the Armenian Genocide Centennial Planned in the Nation's Capital

Leaders of the Armenian Church in the United States have joined to plan a special remembrance of the Armenian Genocide next year. Commemorating the passage of 100 years since the start of the first genocide of the 20th century, a schedule of events including an ecumenical prayer service at the National Cathedral, a memorial concert, public exhibitions and a Pontifical Divine Liturgy will take place from May 7 to 10, 2015, in Washington, D.C.

His Holiness Karekin II, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians, and His Holiness Aram I, Catholicos of the Great House of Cilicia, will both journey to the United States to lead and participate in the commemorative events.

A National Centennial Committee has been formed under the auspices of the Diocese and the Prelacy to oversee and guide the commemorative activities. The Committee, chaired by Dr. Noubar Afeyan, Boston-based entrepreneur and philanthropist, includes leaders from Armenian religious, political, and civic organizations from across the United States. The Committee includes Archbishop Khajag Barsamian, Primate of the Eastern Diocese of the Armenian Church of America; Archbishop Hovnan Derderian, Pri-

mate of the Western Diocese of the Armenian Church of North America; Archbishop Oshagan Choloyan, Prelate of the Eastern Prelacy of the Armenian Apostolic Church of America; Archbishop Moushegh Mardirossian, Prelate of the Western Prelacy of the Armenian Apostolic Church of America, and Archbishop Vicken Aykazian, Legate of the Eastern Diocese of the Armenian Church of America.

"We are organizing these events in the nation's capital in order to involve the country's political leaders, raise awareness in the non-Armenian community, and honor countries and individuals that have helped Armenians during and after the Genocide," said committee chair Dr. Afeyan. "We are honored that Catholicos Karekin II and Catholicos Aram I will be among us, blessing the occasion, as together we stand up for the Armenian presence in America and in the world," he added.

The National Centennial Committee has met several times and is working together with Washington D.C.-based sub-committees to plan the various events and activities. The Committee is working closely with the Central Commemorative Committees for the United States and Armenia to coordinate the activities.

I Remember and Demand



Do you know what message does the logo of the Centenary of the Armenian Genocide convey?

"Forget-Me-Not Flower": The etymology of the flower's name in different languages shows that it conveys the same meaning – "REMEMBER!" The latter is exactly the main message of the 100th anniversary. Eventually in the Middle Ages the Forget-Me-Not was considered the symbol of God's presence.

Five leaves of the flower symbolize five continents, where the Genocide survivors found a shelter being deprived of the opportunity to live in their homeland. They were disseminated all over the world forming a big Armenian diaspora. And today, on these five continents there

live people, who condemn the Genocide, they REMEMBER & DEMAND. The flower has four main colors: violet, light violet, yellow and black. Each color conveys a certain meaning. The color of black (past) symbolizes horror and the memories of the Genocide. The inner light violet (present) stands for a unifying idea.

The color of violet (future) is suggested as the main color of the symbol. It is widely used in vestments worn by the priests of the Armenian Apostolic Church

The yellow color (eternity) symbolizes the sunlight which gives a hope to live and create. It is represented by cyclically ordered 12 stylized pillars symbolizing the Genocide Memorial (*Tsitsernakaberd*).

The slogan "I Remember and Demand" is specially emphasized and individualized so that every time we say the words, we remember the stories of our families and the tragedy that we Armenians experienced and present the demand to the whole world.

Bishops' Synod Convenes at the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin Armenian Genocide victims to be canonized on April 23, 2015

The ceremony of canonization of the Armenian Genocide victims will take place on April 23, 2015 at the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin. The decision was made at the Bishops' Synod convened at the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin November 11-13 under the presidency of His Holiness Karekin II, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians; and His Holiness Aram I, Catholicos of the Great House of Cilicia. The Second Bishops Synod brought together 58 Bishops and Archbishops from the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin and the Great House of Cilicia.

The Synod also adopted a statement, in which it called on the Christian world to join the prayer on the 100th commemoration of the Armenian Genocide. Members of the Bishops' Synod also called on the international community to continue the efforts towards international recognition and condemnation of the Armenian Genocide and reestablish the "just rights" of the Armenian people.

The first Bishops' Synod of the Armenian Church, which commenced Tuesday, September 25-27, 2013 at the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin after a six century-long interval, had two main subjects on the agenda – canonization of the Armenian Genocide victims and the package on the Baptism ceremonial rite.

Did You Know That...

The Badarak, not counting the priest's prayers, is about 4,700 words long but has only 1,400 different roots, of which 200 constitute approximately 80% of the text. Eu (Yev = and) is the most common word; it occurs 438 times and constitutes nearly 10% of the text. This means that if you knew only the word Eu, you'd already understand 1 out of every 10 words of the Mass. Moreover, if you knew 199 other words and their variants, you would understand 8 out of every 10 words in the Mass.




Ms. Ann Lousin donated a chalice cover and Gospel cloth set in loving memory of her parents Max B. Lousin and Opal M. Lousin.


